- 4. **Sagarhawa:** The massacre site of the Sakyas.
- 5. **Araurakot:** The natal town of Kanakamuni Buddha.
- 6. **Sisaniya:** The industrial city of the ancient Sakyas.

Visitor can also pay a visit to the Kapilavastu museum while in Tilaurakot.

A must-see site while staying in Jagadihspur home-stay is Lumbini, the birthplace of Lord Sakyamuni Buddha, about 30km to the east, on the way to Gautam Buddha Airport, Bhairahawa.

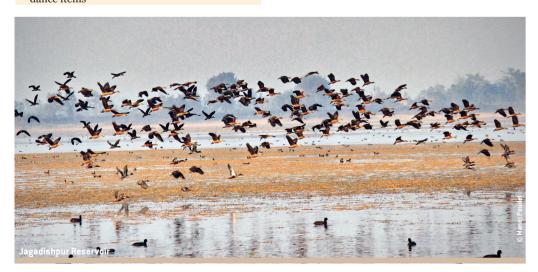

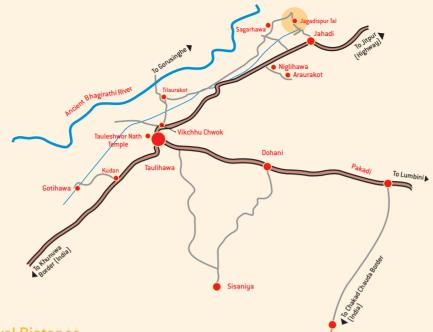

Getting There

Jagadishpur can be reached via Tilaurakot (approx. 10km) or directly via Jitpur (approx. 13km) or Bangai (approx. 10km) on the East-west Highway. Visitors are advised to have their own vehicle although there are basic public transport facilities available in the area. Bhairahawa, Lumbini, Taulihawa, Jitpur and Bangai can be reached easily by using the standard bus services offered by numerous public transport service operators. Local public transport facilities are also available in Bhairahawa-Lumbini-Taulihawa and Jitpur-Jahadi-Taulihawa routes.

Jagadishpur home-stay is about 10km from Jitpur via Jahadi, about 12km from Tilaurakot via Niglihawa and about 10km from Tilaurakot via Sagarhawa through the Buddha Road.

Introduction

Jagadishpur Jalasaya Tharu Home-stay is situated on the bank of Nepal's largest man made reservoir, Jagadishpur Tal, about 10 km north of Tilaurakot in Kapilavastu district.

The indigenous Tharu communities residing in the Jagadishpur Tal area, who

substantially claim to be the descendants of the ancient Sakvas are also the custodians of many ancient Buddhist heritage sites including Tilaurakot. Niglihawa, Sagarhawa etc. In recent days, these Tharu people are also preserving and promoting the country's largest man made reservoir, The Jagadishpur Tal (listed as a RAMSAR site) making it a suitable habitat for many residential and migratory birds. Jagadishpur Tharu Home-stay is an effort of these local people to offer basic but unique accommodation facilities and cultural experiences to the visitors who come to Jagadishpur reservoir and Buddhist heritage sites.

Home-stay at Jagadishpur Tharu Village

- Jagadishpur Tharu village is the first community based home-stay in the ancient Kapilavastu, the hometown of Lord Sakvamuni Buddha.
- 13 Tharu houses have developed basic home-stay facilities, that basically include clean accommodation facilities (currently 26 beds), typical Tharu food and Tharu cultural experiences.
- Visitors are treated as guests and are

- offered opportunity to have first-hand experience of the age-old cultures and hospitality of the people who claim themselves as progenies of the ancient Sakva clan.
- Visitors may have opportunities to experience many festivals as well as rites and rituals that are observed through the lives of local Tharu people during their stay in the village.
- Stick dance and Dandiva Dance are performed upon request by the visitors in the evening.

Home-stay Tour Packages and **Activities**

- · Jagadishpur Jalasaya Tharu Homestay offers a unique tourism experience combining cultural, natural and Buddhist heritage experiences in a single visit.
- All accommodations and meals are offered in the typical Tharu homes on a rotational basis. Each host family provides clean bed, toilet and a family dining room.
- · The hosts welcome and bid farewell to the visitors by offering Tika, garland or a bouquet of flowers.
- · Visitors may choose activities of their preference upon arrival in the village. The activities that are currently offered by the home-stays in the village include the followings:

Major cultural activities include the followings:

- Staying at the typical Tharu village and enjoying local organic food and beverages including typical Tharu dishes such as Dhakeri, Chicher, Sohina, Ghongi etc.
- · Cycling or walking through the Jagadishpur Tharu village and other typical rural villages such as Jahadi, Nigali, Tilauri, Shivpur, Harnampur etc.
- Observing the local craftsmanship of Tharu women. This includes local Muchh and fiber made Dhikri, mat etc.
- Observing the traditional fishing practices of Tharu men in the local ponds, irrigation canals and Banganga (ancient Bhagirathi) river near the villages.
- Observing and participating the traditional Tharu cultural dance in the evening.
- Visiting other popular religious sites such as Tauleshwor Nath Temple, Ram Ghat, Laxman Ghat-Bolbom Dham, Samay Mai, Patthar Kot etc.
- Enjoying day sightseeing tour to either Supa Deurali in Arghakhanchi district or Shivagadhi Temple in Kapilavastu-Dang district border. You may hire a private vehicle or use one of the local transportation facilities to complete this

ii. Natural Experiences

Major natural activities include the followings:

- Bird watching at the country's largest man made reservoir Jagadishpur Tal, which is the home for about 169 species of birds, 11 of them are rare.
- · Evening and morning eco-walks in the 5km long wilderness path built along the reservoir.
- Spending leisure time sitting at the bank of the reservoir or watching the tranguil lake water and birds from the view tower.
- Guided jungle walk to Tilaurakot Saihedhari forest and ancient Bhagirathi river (Banganga river).
- Fishing and swimming in the Banganga river.
- Recreational fishing and boating opportunities in the reservoir (to be in operation soon).
- Day hiking and trekking to Churia Hill through KapilDham and Shringi Ashram.

Jagadishpur reservoir is the largest man made reservoir in Nepal and inlisted in the list of Wetlands of International Importance, known as RAMSAR site in 2003. It is spread over 225 hectares with 157 hectares covered by water surface. Maximum depth of lake is 5 meters in south-west with average depth of 3 meters. It has a capacity to hold 47,500,000 cubic

liters of water. Apart from being a natural habitat to the indigenous ones, the lake lies on the flight path of migratory birds from Siberia, Russia, China, Mongolia, Central Asia, Turkmenistan and Kirgizstan. It is also a home to 9 species of turtles, 25 species of snakes, 23 species of mammals, 39 to 47 species of fish and 14 species of lizards. The lake irrigates 6350 hectares of surrounding agricultural field benefitting more than 6700 households.

iii. Spiritual Experiences-Visit to **Buddhist Heritage Sites**

One of the unique features of this home-stay which sets it apart from other home-stays in Nepal is that visitors while enjoying the ethnic hospitality of Tharu people and ecotourism experience at the reservoir can also visit many sacred Buddhist heritage sites including Tilaurakot, the capital city of the ancient Sakva Kingdom and Hometown of Lord Sakvamuni Buddha.

Important Buddhist heritage sites in the area include the followings:

- 1. **Kudan:** The ancient Nyigrodharama where Lord Sakyamuni Buddha met King Suddhodhana for the first time after the enlightenment.
- 2. **Gotihawa:** The birthplace of Krakuchhanda Buddha.
- 3. Niglihawa: The birthplace of Kanakamuni Buddha.
